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Pitching – Trajectory

Before making a pitch you must evaluate and decide what type of trajectory you are attempting to impart upon the ball. Once this has been determined you must first select the correct club from your bag (most often one of the wedges), and second, you must determine where to place the ball in your stance.

The further forward you move the ball in your stance (i.e. toward your target) the higher the resulting trajectory will be. The further back you move the ball the lower the trajectory. This allows you to hit a multiple of different trajectory shots with the same club. It is important to note that the trajectory that the ball takes to arrive at a certain location will, in concert with other factors, determine the amount of additional forward roll you will get on any particular shot. As a rule, a shot with a lower trajectory will result in more forward roll than will a shot with a high trajectory.

Only through practice will you be able to determine which club, in combination with which ball position, results in any given trajectory. Once practiced you can bring your new found knowledge onto the course and lower your scores with shots that get you closer to the hole because you can land the ball where you want to **and** with the appropriate momentum.

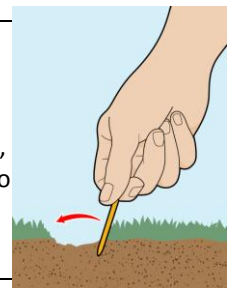

How to repair a ball mark.

When a ball lands on a green it leaves an indentation. These are easy to repair, and will do no damage to the green if fixed right away. Stick a divot repair tool or a tee into the turf around the outside of the mark. Gently lift the compacted soil to loosen and raise it and move around the entire ball mark in a circle. Once you've done this, take your putter and softly tap down the turf so it is level with the rest of the green. The rules of golf allow you to repair ball marks that are on your line. You are not allowed to repair spike marks, but it is a good idea to repair any pitch marks or spike marks you see before leaving the green—as long as you don't hold up play.



Answer: When the ball deflects off the stake and lands in the rough, it is a “rub of the green.” The ball must be played as it lies [Rule 19-1]. A player may remove a moveable obstruction that interferes with his play, but he may not unduly delay play. Thus, a removable stake near his ball may be removed; removing a stake a considerable distance away is not an option [Rules 24-1 and 6-7]. While we’re on the topic of stakes, I would like to remind everyone that out-of-bounds stakes are “fixed.” This means that if the stake interferes with your stance or swing, there is no free relief. If you cannot hit a ball lying near an out-of-bounds stake, you must declare it unplayable and proceed under one of the relief options in Rule 28 (Ball Unplayable). Never attempt to remove these stakes – it is not permitted.

Stakes defining or identifying water hazards, on the other hand, are defined as “obstructions.” If they are movable, you may remove them, regardless of where your ball lies. If they are immovable, then you are entitled to free relief for your stance and swing if your ball is not in the hazard. There is no relief from an immovable obstruction for a ball that lies in a water hazard.

DON'T FORGET – Be good to our course; replace divots, rake bunkers and repair ball marks.
